The Butterfly Effect, as many know, says that small causes can have larger effects. This might seem like an easy idea to understand, but sometimes it is hard to imagine how significant the effects will be. For example, imagine what would happen if an entire species was removed from an area.


In the 1930s, due to safety reasons and nearby ranchers' fears of their livestock being killed, wolves were driven out of Yellowstone National Park. After they were all gone, the people felt more secure. Although the wolves might have seemed like a very small component in the enormous park, they were crucial to the environment. The absence of the wolves caused the elk population in the park to increase significantly. The elks ate lots of the plantation, including the young brush and trees. The situation worried scientists, and they thought of bringing the wolves back into Yellowstone.

In 1995, eight wolves were brought into the Yellowstone National Park from Canada. At first the scientists were afraid that the wolves might leave the park, but thankfully, the wolves stayed. As time went on, the population of the wolves increased, and as scientists expected, the population of elk decreased. With less elk, more plants were able to grow out. More animals started to move into the park, such as birds and beavers. The wolves also hunted coyotes which allowed the number of rabbits and mice to increase, which then brought more hawks, foxes, and other animals into the park. Somehow, the wolves also changed behavior of the rivers. The increased plants, trees, and vegetation in the park meant that the riverbanks were more stable, allowing the river systems to grow and become more healthy.. The park had slowly became healthier and more prosperous.

Since the wolves have been reintroduced, the environment of the park has changed significantly. Although many of these changes have been good

This fall marks the release of two films to be quite excited about: "Kingsman: The Golden Circle" and "Blade Runner 2049." Both films expand on already established fictional worlds and introduce new threats the characters must confront.

Kingsman

Slated for a September 20th release in Taiwan, "Kingsman: The Golden Circle" is the sequel to the well-received "Kingsman: The Secret Service" (2014). The plot of the film is this time the Kingsman have been attacked and their headquarters destroyed. With the fate of the world in the balance, they need to travel to America and ally themselves with a covert US organization named The Golden Circle to try and save the world. Much of the cast will return, with Taron Egerton's starring as Gary 'Eggsy' Unwin and Mark Strong as Merlin. Alongside the returning cast are newcomers Channing Tatum and Jeff Bridges playing US Agents Tequila and Champagne respectively. This sequel promises to bring the comedy and wit of the first film along with some unexpected twists.

The second film being released in America on October 6th, is "Blade Runner 2049" a sequel taking place 30 years after the original "Blade Runner", (1982). This film is set in the year 2049, 30 years after the original which was set in 2019 of a Futuristic Los Angeles filled with replicants, bioengineered androids, indistinguishable from humans, made to serve us. This new film has us following Ryan Gosling's character, Officer K who is a Blade Runner which are officers who specialize in the "retiring" of replicants. As we follow K we discover long buried secrets which leads him to find Rick Deckard (Harrison Ford) and together they go on a journey that could change the course of their world. The "Blade Runner" universe combines sci fi with deep philosophical questions about ethics and identity.

I anticipate that both "Kingsman: The Golden Circle" and "Blade Runner 2049" will be worth watching. Each of these films takes a different mood, but both build on the events of their popular predecessors.
